As I write, the very welcome rain is pattering on my skylights and the tank is full again. I'm sure your gardens are showing signs of Spring, as is mine. I asked a neighbour how he manages to have such a colourful garden all year round. He assures me the only way is to buy plants in flower all year round! I have been following his advice and am enjoying the results. My camellias are a showy backdrop for the violets, daffodils, hyacinths, narcissus and crocus, and tulips and bluebells are on their way. Azaleas are not far behind.

Earlier preparation in the vegetable garden is starting to pay off. Broad beans are beginning to flower, peas and beans shooting, young radishes ready to provide crunch in salads and the carrot seeds I planted with them are germinating, ready to take off when the radishes are gone. The herb garden is coming alive again too. Merino Magic is working its magic and well worth the investment.

My lemon tree survived the snow and I have had another bumper crop. They are Meyer lemons and very juicy. Lemons are so versatile in the kitchen. I preserved some in brine to use in Moroccan Lamb, which is a family favourite. Seville oranges grown locally have paired with some of my lemons when making marmalade. Not quite lemonade weather yet but there will still be some for when the warmer weather comes. A lemon tree is a pantry in the garden.

There are still six places left on our Pre-Festival Tour. We will be visiting four very special gardens and they will inspire you to greater things in your own garden so do join us if you are able. Once again Leura Garden Festival is almost upon us and I encourage you to visit as many gardens as you can as well as support the Plant Sales Centre. This is such a wonderful community effort to get behind Katoomba Hospital and improve facilities there for us all.

Our Speaker today is David Kennedy.

David Kennedy moved to the Upper Blue Mountains in June 2000 and started the early stages of his well-known cool temperate garden, Clover Hill. Since then Clover Hill has been featured in many national gardening and lifestyle magazines.

In November 2014, David and partner Andrew Dunshea embarked on a new garden, Highfields, over the mountain in Little Hartley and today we will find out what happened next. An article on Highfields will feature in the Spring edition of the GCA magazine, *Our Gardens*. It is also on the cover and part of a new book, *Australian Dreamscapes*, by Claire Tacaks.

David is a plant collector, importing many rare and unusual plants and bulbs from around the world, but without at the same time losing the feel for garden design. He states, "A plant collection is nothing more than a plant collection unless put together well! It can look like nothing other than a mish mash of plants that have no flow or connection." David and Andrew exhibit at the Collectors' Plant Fair each year where you can purchase these special plants at their stand.

David also has a mail order nursery called Clover Hill Rare Plants, selling many of his rare and garden-worthy plants that grow well in the mountains in normal garden situations (no bore water used here!). They are plants that have been tried and tested. We have the opportunity to purchase plants from David today.
