Guest Speaker Peta Trahar – Town and Country Gardens – Hydrangeas

Peta Trahar was raised in Tasmania, lived in Mosman in Sydney and now calls *Woodgreen Angus Stud* at Bilpin, home. Peta is a graduate of Ryde School of Horticulture. Her experience includes working as a landscape lecturer, writer, garden judge and selector for Australia's Open Garden Scheme, now closed. She is a regular contributor to the GCA magazine, *Our Gardens*.

Peta was the co-founder of the highly successful Collectors' Plant Fair. In 2005, together with Beth Stokes, Peta was awarded NSW Horticulturist of the Year and the National Award of Excellence "for promoting horticulture, particularly the use and conservation of rare and unusual plants through the organisation of the Collectors' Plant Fair." Peta is currently President of Kurrajong Heights Garden Club.

Woodgreen, the 2 acre [garden](#) within a larger property, was established in the 1960's by Justice Philip Woodward. Peta and Peter Trahar bought *Woodgreen* in 1986. Since then, the garden and nursery have been developed and intensively planted with an eye to colour and texture.

The garden is a product of Peta's collecting of unusual plants since establishing a first garden in the 1970's. It is now the source of the plants in the nursery. The range includes perennials, shrubs and bulbs among others. Many are rare. You can view the garden on Peta's Facebook page, Town and Country Gardens or her website petatraharnursery.com.au.

Dirt (It ain't Soil)

Dirt is the most important part of any garden. Without dirt the plants won't grow, which is why hydroponics works so well and air plants grow.

Hang on!!

So what is going on? What is dirt anyway?

Dirt (not soil) is a mixture of sand, clay and silt.

Sand is weathered quartz. It has the coarsest grains giving an open, free draining, well aerated dirt which is easy for the roots to grow through. It's like a bed of small marbles.

Sand gives no nutrients to the plants, so, if growing in sand you need to feed the plant everything it needs.

Clay has the finest grains and they stick together to make a waterproof layer, so holding water.



So this is good isn't it? We now have water and anything dissolved in it. But most plants don't like wet feet.

And finally, we come to silt. Silt grains are between sand and clay. Silt is a mixture of sand and weathered feldspar rock which as it continues to weather forms clay.

So, dirt, for all its pretence, is just worn-out old rocks present as sand, clay or almost clay. It does little but hold moisture and minerals and provides a medium which is easy for roots to grow through.

So why do plants grow? Because of the organic matter and chemicals that we add to make soil. But that's another story.
