## A message from the President.....

Autumn is such a lovely time of year. The Blue Mountains hosts many visitors who come specifically to take in the spectacular colour changes along the highway through the many villages that make up this heritage listed area. As the season changes, the temperature drops, days get shorter with less direct sunlight; this causes the chlorophyll in the leaves to break down which in turn reveals yellow and orange pigments that were already in the leaves, but was masked during the warmer months. When autumn arrives time seems to slow down, allowing a moment to reflect on the garden tasks that can now wait till the return of spring. Autumn can be the harbinger of change and transformation, resetting our inner clock, inspiring us to evaluate our lives. I googled some ideas on what to do about them. A child's windmill costing \$2.00 with lots of bright colours and sparkling blades has been erected and, to my delight, has done the trick. There are a few easy solutions on the internet for getting control over most annoying garden problems. It's not only birds, but hailstorms, strong wind, persistent rain and hotter than normal summer days that can discourage any enthusiastic gardener. But we keep at it because we love the results even if for only a few days.

For those who went on the bus trip to the Collectors' Plant Fair, I'm told the day was enlightening with a vast array of stalls and gave insight into the number of plants that can be cultivated in this region. Please share your experience with us at a general meeting to let members know what took your fancy, what you found interesting and what new plant you discovered. Those members who went enjoyed a wonderful time together, and the day evolved without disruption. The Nooroo, Wildwood excursion, May 4, is shaping up to be equally as stimulating and restful. Nothing to think about, but to be driven to two lovely gardens, have lunch and take in the wonder of someone else's hard work.

## Today's Speaker is Lis Bastian – BMCC Program Lead, Planetary Health Initiative



Lis Bastian is the Senior Lead for Blue Mountains City Council's Planetary Health Initiative, and she will be speaking about the Planetary Health Precinct Plan at the old Katoomba Golf Course, as well as the Initiative's city-wide program to strengthen community, heal Country and restore the health of our planet.

Before taking on this position, Lis had a long career spanning the arts, community development and environment. She has been an art teacher in schools and TAFE as well as an Education Officer at the AGNSW, curator of Orange Regional Gallery, CEO of Arts OutWest and Varuna, the Writers House, and she ran a gallery in Blackheath called "Stop Laughing this is Serious". She trained with Al Gore as a Climate Ambassador, founded the Blue Mountains Permaculture Institute with Rowe Morrow, and wrote a Regional Resilience Strategy for Central NSW when she was Centroc's Climate Adaptation Officer. She also founded the local Charity, The Big Fix Ltd, which shares solutions media and runs Blackheath Community Farm. She is a passionate gardener.
